BRIDGE MINISTER'S COLUMN:

Minister's Message, May Church Bells

"But wanting to justify himself, [the lawyer] asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbor?'" (Luke 10:29). This line precedes the Good Samaritan parable. As soon as this lawyer asked, or as soon as any of us begin to question who is my neighbor, we signal we are looking for loopholes in the ethic of the Master. Never a good sign! Still, Jesus answered the man's question by telling his famous parable. The antipathy between Jews and Samaritans was so great, they did not like even to travel through each other's territory. The shorter route from the Galilee to Jerusalem took a traveler through Samaria, but most took the longer road through the Jordan Valley. To travel by way of Samaria risked catcalls, rocks thrown at you, all manners of danger. I suspect the Samaritans avoided Jewish territories for the same reason. The parable Jesus told does not say that the victim was a Jewish man, but we assume so. We can come up with all sorts of excuses why the priest and Levite did not stop to help the poor man who fell into the hands of robbers:

- They were in a hurry.
- To stop and help the man, were he dead, would render the two unclean and unable to work in the Temple.
- The robbers could still be nearby, waiting to entrap more victims.

There may have been other reasons, but only one man stopped. He was an unlikely choice. The hatred between Jews and Samaritans—looking down on each other and questioning each other's morality and religion—gave Jesus' story a surprise twist that made hearers stop to listen and think about his point. Such was Jesus' power as a teacher. The Samaritan could have used all the excuses of the other two, but he didn't. He gave the man clothing to cover his nakedness, cleaned his wounds with wine and oil, gave him water to drink, and took him to an inn. There he paid the man's board and spent the night with his charge. In the morning he gave the innkeeper two denarii and asked him to take care of the fellow. (A denarius was a coin and one-day's wages for a laborer.) When business was done in Jerusalem in a few days, the Samaritan promised to return and pay the innkeeper whatever other expenses he incurred caring for the man.

Jesus ended his story by asking which of the three was a neighbor to the man set upon by robbers? The answer was so obvious that the embarrassed lawyer must have lowered his head and muttered, "The Samaritan, the one who showed mercy." Jesus then said, "Go and do likewise."

Anytime we ask, "But who is my neighbor?" we are kidding ourselves if we think we are mature and clever disciples. We are not. In looking to make all the distinctions we live by—race, religion, sex, political party, job, where we live or went to school, well, you can all fill in the categories—we miss the point of discipleship. Neighbors show mercy to one another. The neighbor is whoever comes our way regardless of whatever differences between him or her and us. What are the stakes? Remember the lawyer's opening question to the Lord, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Eternal life, life with God: high stakes. Jesus answered by getting the lawyer to repeat Jesus' own two commandments. "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your strength, and all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." This was and is the distinctive ethic for Jesus' disciples.

His two commandments go together. We cannot love God and ignore or hate our neighbor. Nor can we fully love the neighbor without seeing the Creator's image in our neighbor. It is one of the *deceptively simple complexities* of our faith. Yet, like the lawyer in the story, we keep looking for loopholes.

I don't think there are any.


The library can be reached by entering through the back door of the church. Go up the stairs and turn left. A short way down the hall is the library.




