MINISTER'S COLUMN: Rev. Dr. Scott Couper

As the gospel according to Luke tells us, Jesus began his ministry in Galilee at Nazareth with a short sermon. Jesus quoted Isaiah saying he was to bring good news, heal and proclaim the inauguration of God's realm (4:18-19). And from that period on, Jesus seems to get himself in all sorts of arguments and trouble. No sooner had Jesus rolled-up Isaiah's scroll, Jesus managed to fill with rage those gathered in the synagogue (4:28) and, (Oh, my hat!) one verse later Jesus was thrown-out (4:29).



God and you called me to Centre Church. Needless to say, as I began my ministry I prayed the 'honeymoon' after my calling would last at least a few more seconds longer than Jesus' did!

Thankfully, it has. I have already preached twice now and I have not been thrown-out yet! In fact, I have been welcomed with beautiful hospitality and graciousness.

Jesus' ministry created some incredible tensions. And so might mine. However, Jesus and my ministries are different in emphasis, though they serve the same God. Jesus' ministry was revolutionary and prophetic. He turned the world upside down. I believe my ministry needs to be more pastoral, more healing. Not that Jesus was not pastoral. He certainly was! Not that Jesus did not heal. He certainly did! Not that I won't be prophetic. I will!

You see, it is a matter of emphasis. I perceive that Centre Church already hears the gospel Jesus proclaimed and, though imperfectly, has lived it out since 1816. Throughout its history, Centre Church and its ministers have taken bold stances in the name of the gospel and the church currently serves the most marginalized through its extensive Christian outreach.

I believe I am called to support, empower and strengthen that which Centre Church already does well. I hope to care for you, so you can continue to serve the world in Christ's name!

Loaves and Fishes, Brattleboro Children's Centre, the Overflow Shelter, The Pastoral Counseling Center, and Our Sister Parish outreach to El Salvador all must grow from strength to strength. Centre Church will live-out more fully its proclamation to be an Open & Affirming congregation and Just Peace church.

I feel called to strengthen and empower you to do more fully that which you are and have been doing for so many years.

So, from here on out, 'you' is now 'we'.

I seek to be pastoral so we can continue to be prophetic.

BROWN BAG GROUP will not be meeting in August, but will reconvene the first Wednesday at noon in September. It will be a time of sharing summer experiences.



FROM NAN MANN, Brattleboro Centre for Children

Fortunately, all our rooms now have air-conditioning, so the children and staff could stay comfortable even if not able to be outside as much as we like. We also welcomed Micah and Maddie (Rev. Scott's teenage children) as volunteers in some of our class-rooms. Their presence is cheerful and engaging. The children loved them. We thank Scott for offering them to us and thank them for their willingness.

August has us looking toward a graduating class of six going to Kindergarten in many area public schools, in Vernon, Brattleboro, and Newfane. After that, we prepare for a week of in-service for the staff while the children take a week off from school. We will come back after Labor Day, as usual, ready for new rooms and new arrangements and new perspectives. August, therefore, is a month of preparation and moving toward all the next year has to bring us. Respectfully,

I have been running Carry Me Home for over two years now, collecting, sorting, packing aid for the refugees stranded in Greece, communicating with volunteers who have been helping on the ground, but nothing prepared me for what I have witnessed. I have witnessed families with an infant and a pregnant woman sleeping on a street in front of a refugee camp, because they were not allowed in for five weeks.

I have witnessed two brothers (16 and 12 years old) living alone in a refugee hotel, because their father was taken away from them at gunpoint from their home in Afghanistan and their mother brought them to Greece, but left them there, because the only way she could help them was to pay someone to take her to Holland. So she could later send for her boys when she is settled in

her boys when she is settled in.

I have witnessed families with little children who walked for 70 days without food to get away from their war effected country.

I have witnessed people struggling, after leaving everything they had in their countries, to save their lives and the lives of their families.

Thank you to the parishioners of the Centre Congregational Church for the support.

Together we can make a difference.
