Has anyone noticed? For the past year-and-a-half there has not been many, if any, homeless sleeping on the streets in Brattleboro. Now, this morning, I observed a person sleeping on a Pliny Park bench. The reason: On July 1, Vermont's pandemic related emergency housing in hotels and motels voucher program ended. With its conclusion, about 700 people out of 2,100 (1/3) had to vacate their state sponsored accommodation. Understandably, there is *not* an outcry from some. Understandably, there is an outcry from others.

There is *not* an outcry from some because according to the *Brattleboro Reformer* 2/3 of the indigent population can remain accommodated for at least another 84 days as they are 'vulnerable' (families with children, disabled, over 60, pregnant, victims of abuse or violence). Presumably, the other 1/3 is capable of living without state sponsored accommodation and thus 'not vulnerable'. There is not an outcry from some because almost 80 million dollars has already been spent, it could only be afforded because the Federal Emergency Management Agency paid the bill, and this font of money is drying. Presumably, those who are 'not vulnerable' had plenty of time to save while being housed *gratis* by the government for so long. There is not an outcry from some because the 1/3 who are vacating are being given \$2,500 (that's two or three months' rent) upon departure from the hotel program – and up to \$8,000 is possible - in addition to the savings that should have been made from not having to pay rent or mortgage for over a year. One could honestly say, such largess should be responded to with a big 'thank you' rather than with an ungrateful 'more!' Last but not least, the hotels are opening back-up for business and they need the space.

There is an outcry from others because it is far more expensive for society *not* to provide accommodation for homeless people than it is to accommodate them. According to *VT Digger*, it costs \$97 a night per room (or about \$40-\$50 a night per person) to accommodate the homeless. Emergency room visits, law enforcement expenses, addiction recovery programs, incarceration, profit losses for businesses, etc... all cost far more. So, there is a good argument that it costs more *not* to accommodate the homeless than it does to accommodate them.

As people of faith, we must ask, 'what are we called to do and say as followers of Jesus' way?'

No matter right or wrong, after reading the gospels I can't conceive that Jesus would respond by saying 'enough is enough and no more – fend for yourself'. No matter right or wrong, after reading the gospels I can't conceive that Jesus would respond by saying 'it is cheaper to take care of the homeless than it is to *not* take care of them'. I do not think Jesus' 'sayings and doings' would be based on an individual's merit ('does one deserve help?') nor do I think Jesus would be weighing economic advantages and disadvantages ('Is treating an overdose and accommodating folk in correctional facilities more expensive than providing safe and secure housing?').

First, my understanding of the gospels leads me to understand that Jesus' 'sayings and doings' regarding the homeless in Brattleboro would be based on his vision of the kin-dom of God. Second, my understanding of the gospels leads me to understand that Jesus' 'sayings and doings' regarding the homeless in Brattleboro would be based on the belief that all people are made in God's image (*imago dei*) and that God's will is that all reach their fullest God-given potential. Neither one of these considerations are dependent upon, one, personal responsibility accountability (that I affirm) nor with, two, a societally beneficial fiscal balance sheet (that I also affirm). As a follower of Christ whose allegiance is to our church, my perspective is neither liberal nor conservative. It is, or should be, well, 'Christ-like'.


