I enjoy listening to Esther Burnham (*A Year Remembered*, Women's Fellowship, Centre Congregational Church, 1983). Let us hear her again in this New Year.

After Christmas

The carols are stilled, the Book is closed
On the oft-read story of a manger and Babe,

In the new year, we will be exploring a partnership with the Sacred Places initiative as an extension to our long-range planning and vitality processes. We will need a new small fresh crop of leaders to direct our church's future. After July, I will be taking my first three-month sabbatical from Centre Church after five years of service. This year, we will need strong lay leadership so that our church does not miss a beat. This year we will continue to improve our The Green at Centre front lawn ministry that seeks to bring the church out on to Main Street. We continue to see new faces at our church – and the key to continue to be blessed by them is to establish personal relationships with them. Our passion for our church must be demonstrated by our extension of personal hospitality to those who are interested in what our faith community has to offer. Last but not least, our passion for the gospel of Jesus Christ cannot be confined to Sunday morning services. Rather, it needs to be seen and spread in our community through an increased involvement in the NAACP, the LGBTIQA+ community, justice networks (such as Action Corps and Vermont Interfaith Action), peace initiatives (such as Peace Jam), and forums (such as Compassionate Brattleboro).

We have just enjoyed the blessings spoken of in Esther's first stanza. Let us now in this new year demonstrate the passion she expressed in the second stanza. Happy New Year! Be well.

I am happy to report that Council approved the proposal of the Long-Range Planning Team to work with the Partners for Sacred Places. Over the next six months, using their skills and expertise, we will investigate possibilities for our future, particularly as it regards the use of our building. The purpose of "Community Asset Mapping" (which is what we will be doing) is to work with other potential friends and allies in Brattleboro who share our goals, in order to fully utilize the great resource of our church building. This does not mean we are committed to changing the use of our building – just to exploring possibilities. The \$10,000 cost will not come from the operating budget or the endowment, but from a separate fund (the Johnson Family Fund).

Financially, we continue to spend more than we earn – we have withdrawn about \$45,000 from the endowment so far this year, in order to meet our expenses (much less than the predicted \$100,000). In terms of pledges for next year, we have received pledges of \$82,000 from 35 pledging units. We hope there are still more people out there planning to pledge.

We have been fortunate to receive a very generous bequest from Gisela Robeck. She was very committed to the church in so many ways. And now, from her position in heaven, she is still watching over our church, and we are extremely grateful!

I hope you have all received a copy of the results of the Congregational Self-Evaluation. If not, please let Bruce know, and we can send you one. Our evaluation team is now summarizing the results of the evaluation of the minister. These will be presented to Scott soon, and he will draw up an action plan for next year, based on our suggestions. This will be shared with the congregation.

Wishing you a Happy New Year, and hoping 2023 is a good year for Centre Church!

MISSION & SERVICE



O Christmas Tree, Oh Christmas Tree

In Dot Vander Meulens's book *This Jewel on Main Street*, the story of the huge tree that once filled the church's whole front yard is told. It had been planted by Dr. John Lord. It was a little blue Spruce planted in the middle of the church front yard. He planted it to keep the front yard from becoming a parking lot! That little blue Spruce grew and grew, tall and wide, expanding over much of the front lawn. For many years an anonymous donor paid for the lighting of that tree during the Christmas season. It provided much beauty and pleasure to viewers on Main Street for many years. I never found out who was the mysterious generous donor who paid for the lighting of that tree. Do you know?

This year there were three trees set up by our minister, Scott Couper, and a team of workers and decorators: AJ MacDonald, Mark Baxter, Alison Hale, Martha Swanson and her husband Clay, Dennis Newman, Bonnie Girvan and Drew Kacik. They were a beautiful sight in the front of Centre Church. These three trees were given from the 'tree farm' of Al and Karen Rydant. Tom Harriman assisted, decorating the railings and the sidewalk

For decades the Rydants supplied a big tree for the sanctuary. They hauled it over from their lot in West Chesterfield. It was decorated with lights and ornaments. They donated this until the powers that be outlawed live trees in public buildings. Since then a big artificial tree is erected in the sanctuary.

The story of how the Rydants got into the Christmas tree business is quite amusing...and when you corner Al, ask him about it. Something about making use of land that had once been a dairy farm. They sell trees at a very reasonable price (my neighbor spent \$100 at another tree growing place—that really shocked me!) The Rydant's trees sell for only \$18.

Their sense of humor shows up in the sign in front declaring that these trees are "Organic, Gluten Free, Cage Free, Non-GMO, 0-Cholesterol, and 0-Trans-fat!!" We hope they continue their annual Christmas tree tradition.


